In Order To Have

In Order To Have Eternal Life We Must Walk In The Light When a master went too far in disciplining a child "servant" under his care (as we learned last week), there were certain consequences to pay. In Ex. 21:20, we learn that if a master smote his servant, male or female, and they died, God said they would surely be punished. And we learned the punishment for killing someone was death (i.e., "life for life", Ex. 21:23). But questions often arise in verse 21 where it says, "Notwithstanding, if he

continue a day or two, he shall not be punished: for he is his money." The key word here is punished. This word comes from the Hebrew naqam and is defined as to avenge, revenge, take vengeance, to entertain revengeful feelings. So understanding this word helps us to put this verse in better perspective. When a master choose to discipline

a child under his care and no physical harm was done, then the blood guardians or relatives could not seek revenge on him. The phrase, "for he is his money" simply meant, the one disciplined was under his authority. But what if the master went too far and caused severe bodily injury to the one disciplined. This is where verses 23-27 come into play. Not only would the punisher be requited the same severe bodily injury, but also, the hurt servant would be permitted to be set free from the debt of their master.

So as we see, the master couldn't do anything he wanted with those that served him, rather he had an obligation of care and concern for them. This is quite different from modern horror stories of slavery, where the master did what he willed without any type of consequences to pay.

This is further established by the situation spoken of in Ex. 21:7-11, that if a man sold his daughter to be a maidservant, God said, she shall not go out as the menservants do (7). In other words, God protected the woman,

and here is how. If the master who purchased the woman (i.e., sold herself for work, Deut. 15:12) desired her as his wife and in time things didn't work out, the master could not sell her to another nation (the punishment for this was death, Ex. 21:16), but he was to redeem her back into her family. Or, if the master gave this same woman to his son, God said that the master was to treat her "after the manner of daughters" (Ex. 21:9), and if the

son took another wife, the son was to continue to show her affection and not diminish the duty of marriage toward her (Ex. 21:10). If God's commandments weren't followed, she was to be set free back into her own family (Ex. 21:11).

So what we see in these cases is justice and fairness. God never permitted people to take advantage of others, rather God's nation was a nation that respected all men, regardless of position and wealth. If God is not a respecter of persons, neither should his people be. May God be praised!

Our final chapter (66) deals with an ominous warning. Verse 1 sets the tone: "Thus saith the Lord, The heaven is my throne, and the earth is my footstool: where is the

house that you built me? and where is the place of my rest?" God apprised Israel and the entire world that He



alone is Sovereign and that all those who inhabit the earth are at his disposal - "For all those things hath mine hand made, and all those things have been, saith the Lord..." (2a). Hence, what God desired and looked for, especially from among His people was "him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembles at his word" (2b). God desired a people who truly feared and revered Him, but sadly what He found from among His people were those that "had chosen their own ways and who delighted in their abominations" (3c). Therefore, based on their actions. God would punish and destroy them, and likened it to "a voice from the city, a voice from the temple, a voice of the Lord that renders recompense to his enemies" (6).

From verses 7 until the end of the chapter, God prophesied (as He had done previously before) concerning the coming King and kingdom (church) that would replace defunct Israel, as she was rejected and destroyed. He begins by establishing an outstanding thing, that before Zion (Jerusalem) travailed in pain before birth, she brought forth a man child (7-8). In other words, before Israel's destiny

of rejection and destruction had come to full fruition, God's message concerning a coming king and kingdom was summoned. It would begin with a man child ("king"), who would eventually establish his kingdom, and this kingdom would "extend peace" to the entire world and would comfort all inhabitants (11-13). This no doubt referred to the nation of Israel during the days of the Romans (before their destruction in AD 70), who eventually gave way to the man child, Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ would then establish His kingdom (church) which all men were to be a part of in order to be saved (Matt. 16:18: Acts 2:41.47: 1 Cor. 12:13; Eph. 4:4-6; Col. 3:15; 1 Cor. 15:24).

All those outside of the purview of the new king and kingdom, the Lord would pour forth his wrath and indignation (14-17, cf. Rev. 14:1-14). God as supreme judge, knowing all men's thoughts and actions (18a, cf. Heb. 4:13), shall gather all men (all nations) in order that they might see His glory upon holy Jerusalem, meaning the king's new kingdom (the church) (18b-20, cf. Phil. 2:10-11).

In the end, God's new world and people (new kingdom) will serve and worship Him forever and ever (22-23), but all those that choose to transgress God's commandments shall be punished with everlasting fire and God's people will see them as an abhorrent unto God and His righteousness (24). May God be praised!

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What Must I Do?

Nearly two thousand years ago an important question was raised before the Apostles after they had delivered the good news of Jesus's life, death, burial, and resurrection (Acts 2:21-36). The hearer's conscience were pricked of sinful conduct (2 Cor. 7: 10-11) and asked: "Men and brethren, what shall we do (in order to be saved)? (Acts 2:37). Without hesitation, Peter elevated his voice and proclaimed: "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38).

Upon hearing the words of Peter, the people obeyed. This demonstrated their belief in Christ (Jn. 8:24). Hence, they repented of sin and confessed allegiance to the name of Christ (Matt. 10:32-33). Afterwards, the people were baptized for the remission of their sins (Acts 2:41, cf. Mrk. 16:16; 1 Pet. 3:21) and given the hope of eternal life (Acts 2:38).

The people's submission to the words of salvation granted them a relationship with God the Father by accessing citizenship into the church of Christ (Acts 2:47, cf. Matt. 16:18; Mrk. 9:1; Acts. 2:1-4). As a member of Christ's body (Acts 8:4) the people were then encouraged to live faithful unto death by conquering sin in their lives (Rev. 2:10; Rom. 6: 4-12; 2 Tim. 4: 6-8). We then await for the coming day in which all men shall be judged the word of God (Jn 12:48; Acts 17:30-31; 2 Cor. 5:10). Will we be ready?

SHEPHERD'S CORNER

In Order To Have Eternal Life We Must Walk In The Light

Having fellowship with God is based on our "walking in the light." Notice what the inspired John wrote, "God is light, and in him is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth: but if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:5-7). We are called out of the darkness of the world of sin and into God's light: "But ye are an elect race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession, that ye may show forth the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Pet 2:9).

To "walk in the light" means two things. First, it means that we no longer live in sin. Note that the Lord clearly states that if we "walk in darkness" (that is, in sin), we are not in fellowship with God. To walk in the light means that we have turned our backs on sin to live for Christ: "Having died to sin, might live unto righteousness" (1 Pet. 2:24). Second, to walk in the light means the continual cleansing of the blood of Christ. Even though we strive always to do right, we still sin, as John clearly shows: "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). But if we are walking in the light, the sins we commit do not separate us from God, for the blood of Christ cleanses us from those sins. As Paul wrote, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them that are in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 8:1). Through the blood of Christ we remain in fellowship with God.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life "(John 3:16).
